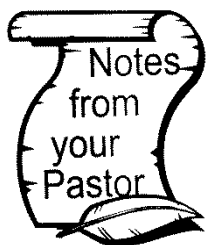
Sick Calls – Please call the rectory to arrange for Father Jasany to bring the Sacraments when a member of your family is hospitalized.

Weddings – Parishioners are asked to call the rectory office at least 6 months in advance of the wedding to schedule an appointment with Father Jasany

Baptisms – The 1st & 3rd Sunday of the month at 12:00 pm. Parents are required to attend Pre-Baptism Class. Arrangements must be made a minimum of 2 weeks prior to the date of baptism. Before parents baptize their child, Diocesan and parish policy requires you to complete a Baptism Preparation Class. **The next class will be on Wednesday, September 10th at St. Stanislaus Parish at 7:00 PM.** Reservations are needed; please call 216-341-9091 for information or to make your reservation.

Godparent and Sponsor Certificate – Sponsors for Baptism or Confirmation must be registered and practicing members of the Church, attending weekly and Holy Day Masses for a minimum of 3 months prior to the celebration of the Sacraments for which they have requested the certificate. Please note individuals 18 years of age and older, no longer in school, need to register.

Attempting to pick up the pieces of one's life after the tragedy of divorce is complex and demanding. One of the significant issues that a person faces is their place in the Church. Does the Church still care about me even though I am divorced? Am I allowed to go to Mass? Can I receive communion? How can the Church help me heal? If I decide to marry again, what do I have to do?

The Tribunal of the Diocese of Cleveland is continuing to offer its very successful First Step Program in order to help with these questions. This program is offered to help everyone, especially those who have experienced divorce, learn more about Catholic teaching in these areas. Representatives from the Ministry to the Divorced Office of the Department for Marriage and Family Ministry will also be present to explain their ministry to those who are divorced. The schedule for the general meetings in 2014 are:

- Tuesday, September 23rd at St. Ambrose Parish, Brunswick at 7 PM.
- Tuesday, October 14th at Immaculate Heart of Mary Parish, Cuyahoga Falls at 7 PM

In any endeavor, taking the “first step” is always the most difficult. The First Step Program helps individuals to navigate the path of healing and closure, of which the annulment process is an important aspect. Everyone is welcome to deepen their knowledge of the Church's teaching on marriage, their ministry to the divorced/separated and discover a path to healing after the divorce. You will also hear the true facts about the annulment process and how to submit a case.

Karen's Corner

Did you know that according to several authors, Jesus was either a Liar, a Lunatic or the Lord? Part of an article I read recently says this: Is Jesus really whom he is reported to have said he was? Was Jesus really the Son of God? C.S. Lewis believed so and also believed that he had a very good argument for convincing people to agree: if Jesus was not whom he claimed, then he must be a lunatic, a liar, or worse. Lee Strobel who wrote "The Case for Christ" asks this same question in his search for truth. Lewis was certain that no one could seriously argue for or accept these alternatives and that left only his favored explanation. Lewis expressed his idea in more than one place, but the most definitive appears in Mere Christianity: "I am trying here to prevent anyone saying the really foolish thing that people often say about Him: "I'm ready to accept Jesus as a great moral teacher, but I don't accept His claim to be God." That is the one thing we must not say. A man who said the sort of things Jesus said would not be a great moral teacher. He would either be a lunatic, on a level with the man who says he is a poached egg, or else he would be the Devil of Hell.

You must make your choice. Either this man was, and is, the Son of God: or else a madman or something worse. You can shut Him up for a fool, you can spit at Him and kill Him as a demon; or you can fall at His feet and call Him Lord and God. But let us not come with any patronizing nonsense about His being a great human teacher. He has not left that open to us. He did not intend to." I love C. S. Lewis and his theology is sound. I have heard all the arguments that Jesus was a myth, or just a great teacher or just a holy man.

Lewis' point here is one that the Catholic Faith is based on: the Incarnation. We believe that Jesus was truly human and truly divine. The gospel of John, in its first chapter, states this very thing: Verse 1: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God." John is telling us that God always was and always will be! Verse 14: "And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen the glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth." Jesus became like us, he became a human being. In essence, there is the belief in the Incarnation. Lewis was an atheist for a good part of his life. In discussion with J. R. R. Tolkien, a good friend, and other philosophers and authors, Lewis was brought back into Christianity.

It is a marvelous story and one I will be touching upon it when we start our discussions on his books, "The Chronicles of Narnia"; which by the way, if you have never read them, you ought to! Like Tolkien, there is deep spirituality in the "children's" stories of Narnia. Each book (there are 7) is a story that is very easy to read and each has its own merits and insights. I still have copies of the 7 books bound as one, available in my office for \$13.00.
