Sick Calls – Please call the rectory to arrange for Father Jasany to bring the Sacraments when a member of your family is hospitalized.

Weddings – Parishioners are asked to call the rectory office at least 6 months in advance of the wedding to schedule an appointment with Father Jasany

Baptisms – The 1st & 3rd Sunday of the month at 12:00 pm. Parents are required to attend Pre-Baptism Class. Arrangements must be made a minimum of 2 weeks prior to the date of baptism. Before parents baptize their child, Diocesan and parish policy requires you to complete a Baptism Preparation Class. **The next class will be on Wednesday, January 7, 2015 at St. Stanislaus Parish at 7 pm.** Reservations are needed; please call 216-341-9091 to make your reservation.

Godparent and Sponsor Certificate – Sponsors for Baptism or Confirmation must be registered and practicing members of the Church, attending weekly and Holy Day Masses for a minimum of 3 months prior to the celebration of the Sacraments for which they have requested the certificate. Please note individuals 18 years of age and older, no longer in school, need to register.

Pre-Cana Program for couples preparing for the Sacrament of Marriage at the Jesuit Retreat House- **Sunday, January 11, 2015 at 12:30 pm.** This program satisfies the requirement for marriage preparation as stipulated by the Catholic Diocese of Cleveland. I hope that you and your family had a Merry Christmas. Our

church looked beautiful and our Christmas Masses were wonderful. I am truly grateful to all who contributed their time, talent and treasure to make our Christmas celebration a holy and joyous event. We are truly blessed by all who helped us and by all who came to celebrate with us.

January 1, 2015 is the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God. It is a Holy Day of Obligation, which means everyone is required to attend Mass. Our Holy Day Schedule includes a 4 pm Vigil Mass on December 31st (New Year's Eve), and 9 am and 11 am Masses on January 1st (New Year's Day). Coming to Mass is a wonderful way to start the New Year.

I would like to make you aware of a change in your church envelopes that are mailed monthly to your households. Since we have completely paid for our new church roof, we will discontinue the Praise the Roof Envelope as of January 2015. Since we always have need of capital improvements and repairs to our four aging buildings, we will have an Improvement Fund Envelope for those who wish to donate to this cause. I wish to express my heartfelt thanks to all those who have pledged to the Diocesan Rooted in Faith Initiative, who used the Praise the Roof Envelope, who made donations, and who worked on various fundraisers so that we could defray the expense of the new church roof, which was \$88,800.00. That was a major accomplishment!

Your continuous payments on your Rooted in Faith pledges as well as your other means of financial support by using your church envelopes and by participating in various parish fundraisers enable us to have a vibrant parish.

My prayer for the New Year is that we continue to grow in our relationship with Christ and one another. Pope Francis encourages all of us to extend to others the invitation to come to Christ. EPIPHANY

Throughout Germany at this time of year, you will find most main doorways inscribed with the following:

20+C+M+B+15.

Children known as Sternsinger (star singers) dress up as the Magi and go door to door, requesting candy for themselves and money for the Church. As they leave, the house is blessed, and the inscription written in chalk. The 20 and 15 refer to the year, the CMB are said to represent either Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar-the Magi-or the Latin Christus Mansionem Benedicat, which means "Christ, bless this home."

Today, we celebrate the feast of the Epiphany, in which we remember the adoration of the newborn Christ by three wise men from the East. This should leave no doubt in anyone's mind just how far and wide the promise of a Savior had spread. These representatives of pagan religions from other lands were determined to pay their respects; it was as if they were born to do this-to acknowledge in some way the beginning of the greatest reign of the greatest king of all. The Epiphany is the third manifestation of the mystery of the Incarnation, following the Annunciation and the birth of Christ. Today is truly the beginning of the paschal mystery.

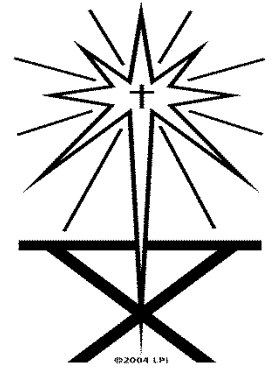

Karen's Corner

Did you know that one of my favorite readings in the Bible is from the prophet, Jeremiah? “The word that came to Jeremiah from the Lord: ‘Come, go down to the potter’s house, and there I will let you hear my words.’ So I went down to the potter’s house, and there he was working at his wheel. The vessel he was making of clay was spoiled in the potter’s hand, and he reworked it into another vessel, as seemed good to him. Then the word of the Lord came to me: ‘Can I not do with you, O house of Israel, just as this potter has done?’ says the Lord. Just like the clay in the potter’s hand, so are you in my hand, O house of Israel.’” (Jeremiah 18:1-6) I have watched a potter at work, and the imagery is just gorgeous! I am not perfect, I am a sinner! And at this glorious time of the year, when I look back over the past year, I know that the Lord wants more of me, and He wants to shape me to his will, not mine.

When the Lord called Jeremiah, Jeremiah’s response was, “But I am just a boy!” When I was called by God to pastoral ministry, my response was very similar. “Are you kidding, Lord? Me? I don’t think so!” Yet here I am. As a minister in the church, I do my best not to impose my will on people, but with deep prayer and meditation, I go where the Lord leads me. I have changed programs mid-year this year because of a suggestion by a parishioner, and others who agreed! That is fantastic that they trust me enough to ask for a program, and I am grateful to be flexible enough to change things for them! My ministry is not about me, it is about those I serve.

This is going to be a year of Scripture in my column, for those who may not be able to attend the sessions on Wednesday nights. Scripture is probably one of the areas that we Catholics are very weak at, because before Vatican II, we weren’t supposed to read the Bible ourselves. Vatican II changed that, but many people do not read the Scriptures because they do not understand HOW to read them. The genres of poetry, parable, song, myth, allegory and many others are just beautiful if they are read with the understanding of the genre as well as the culture of the time when they were written. The Bible is not a book, but it is a library of 73 books written by men and women of faith. It was never meant to be a science or history book! It is a story of faith and love, and we will travel this journey together throughout the New Year!

Pope Francis said, “For the faith to respond, to avoid being suffocated, it must be constantly nourished by the word of God.” We must read God’s word and immerse ourselves in the stories in order to truly understand what God is asking of us. But we must be careful not to pick and choose verses to “prove a point”. That is NOT the purpose of the Bible. There is religious truth in the Bible, but many of the things that were common at the time of the writings, are no longer considered moral. For example: slavery, women and children as property and animal sacrifice. Using a good commentary and even a Bible dictionary along with Scripture reading will help us all to understand God’s words. Both are available for free in an online format. Come on this journey with me this year!

Mary, the Holy Mother of God

January 1st is the oldest celebration of Mary in the Catholic Church. The custom of honoring the Virgin on the first day of the New Year originates in the sixth century, when her celebration was tied to the octave day of Christmas, the eighth day after December 25. In doing so, ancient preachers would remind their congregations about the role that Mary played in the history of salvation. Jesus was born of a woman, and so, as Eucharistic Prayer 4 states, "Made incarnate by the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary, he shared our human nature in all things but sin." The human nature of Christ is rooted in his being born like us. As we round out the Christmas celebration with its Octave Day on January 1, we venerate the woman who gave birth to him. There is a dual action in today's Gospel that is sometimes overlooked. The shepherds find the infant in the manger as has been told to them by the angel. And then they go out to tell others about the child. In the meantime, Mary reflects on all these things in her heart. These are the two complementary stances of the Christian: action and reflection. Both are needed for a balanced spiritual life. It is, in effect, putting into practice the two great commandments: love God and love your neighbor. As we begin the New Year, it is customary to make resolutions: to diet, to exercise, to change something in one's life. Like Mary, who reflected on the events surrounding the birth of her child, we take some time to reflect on our own lives: where we have been, and where we are going. The Gospel gives us the opportunity to situate that reflection in a spiritual context. What does the birth of Jesus mean for me spiritually (reflection), and what do I intend to do about that in my daily life (action)?
